Friends of the Mission,

This is the time of year that many people become sentimental about our country. If you're like me, you think about the liberties you hold dear, like the First Amendment to the Constitution. This amendment gives us the right to believe what we believe, and to teach what we want to teach. It gives us the right to not be caught up in the ever-changing ethic of the day, and helps us keep a biblical ethic which is timeless.

So here is the question for you: How does what you believe affect others in our community that think differently from you?

As Christians. God commands us to love God and our neighbors. The Bible tells us what this love looks like. We don't define it, or we risk disobeving God. The Bible informs us on how we should think and what we should do.



Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength... Love your neighbor as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these. ~Mark 12:30-31~

When it comes to our ever-increasing homeless problem, how you think about it may be drastically different from how your neighbor thinks about it.

As far as I can tell, there are only four ways to think about the homeless problem:

Optimistic: This is looking to the entitlement system to fix the problem. In short, it is spending our way out of the problem. The optimist thinks some day we will build enough housing for everyone that no one will have to camp on the greenway or in our parks.

Pessimistic: This way looks at the optimist and says, "It's never going to work!" The problem is, the pessimist doesn't offer an alternative solution. They are faced with living with the problem or finding another place that doesn't have the same problem.

Delusional: This thinking ignores the problem and acts as if the problem doesn't exist.

Realist: This is a realistic view of what the problem is and a desire to work towards a solution. Realistically, the Mission has developed its own system that works, and we attempt to work side by side with those in our community that have embraced the entitlement system.

We are funded by generous donations from people in our community, and we do not accept any federal, state, or local government funds. Also, we do we seek any funding that would restrict our religious liberties in any way.

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The problem in doing this is that you cannot work too long within their system before you realize the system itself works counter to what you believe and what you value. So working within the system means we work alongside people that think differently than we think. Appreciating them for what they bring to the table, realizing we may be solving a very different problem, yet knowing we both care for people in a very different way.

Our differences really boil down to what we believe and what we value. We believe that God really saves, and when He does, He changes lives. This is put forth in the Word of God and drives us to do what we feel we are called to do.

Our values on the one hand flow out of our beliefs, and they motivate our actions. The Mission values relationships, empowerment, and transformation. It is these three values that help us work with others in our community while not compromising our beliefs.

It is because of our core beliefs and values at the Medford Gospel Mission that for more than 60 years in our community we have been able to reach thousands of people and help bring them out of hopelessness and despair.

As our community continues to change and the problem with homelessness increases, we can look to a document written by our founding fathers almost 250 years ago that protects our beliefs and operations.

More importantly, we can look to the Word of God, a much older and timeless document, inspired by God Himself, that tells us what and why to believe as well as Who to believe.

May the Lord continue to strengthen us in our testimonies of joy and hope in theses chaotic days.
