Merry Christmas,

Every holiday season I watch one of my childhood favorites, *A Charlie Brown Christmas*. You probably remember it well, Charlie and his friends are performing a Christmas pageant, and Charlie asks, "Isn't there anyone who can tell me what Christmas is all about?"

Linus steps up, with the spotlight shining on him and recites Luke 2:8-14:

"And there were in the same country shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. And, lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them: and they were sore afraid. And the angel said unto them, Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you; Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger. And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men."

And then he says. "That's what Christmas is all about, Chārlie Brown."

A couple of things stand out about this 58 year old Christmas special that resonate with me. One is quite subtle but you may have picked it up. When Linus gets to verse 10 he says "fear not" as he drops his ever present comfort

blanket. It's as if, the good news of the gospel is more secure than what typically

brings him comfort.

Linus's "fear not" moment reminds me of the many men and women who have came to the Mission this year to enter into our program, and dropping everything else that they have relied on to bring them comfort in life to pursue a new way of life.

The other thing that stands out is the clear message of peace proclaimed in the text. Peace on earth, good will to men is the message that we certainly need to be reminded of during the advent season. We do our best to keep it on our mind, we may even have the word peace hanging on our tree, in our front yard covered in lights, or displayed on our walls. And our pastors proclaim this peace in advent sermons leading up to Christmas.

The world has a contrasting message for us that doesn't take a break for the holidays. We don't have to look too far and we find that distress and conflict are proclaimed anytime we turn on the news. We hear about wars happening on the other side of the globe and people being divided

politically over every issue under the sun. It seems as if nobody is really looking for peace, at least the type of peace that it proclaimed in the gospel of Jesus Christ.
