We all like stories don't we? Whether it's reading a book, watching a movie, or streaming a series there is something about stories that intrigue us. We can take them in slowly and savor them or we can consume them quickly and binge watch them over the course of a weekend. There are even some stories that we can read, or watch over and over again, and others that are just a waist of time.

Stories are compelling and shape the way we think. They tell us what it means to be happy and successful. They take us away to exotic places we would like to visit or to dangerous places that we would never dare to go. They reveal what we should be concerned about and expose what we find hilarious. At times stories distract us from reality and other times they give us hope in the future and there are even times that stories inspire us to try something new.

And then there are our personal stories that we have written throughout our lives. These stories cover the highs and lows of our lives as well as the joys and heartbreaks. These stories shape us as well and have a lot to do with how we live our lives. At times these stories encourage us to be strong through difficult situations. And then there are times these stories trap us into making poor choices. Sadly there are times these choices become destructive patterns of behavior that become recurring parts of our story.

For the Christian though, there, is another story that should shape our lives. It's *God's story*. The metanarrative of scripture told in four parts; **creation**, **fall**, **redemption**, and **recreation**. *God's story* shapes us like this:

In the **creation** part of the story we realize that God created everything good and man very good. We are made in His image to worship Him and live for Him, caring for the things He has made.

In the **fall** part of the story we realize that sin and death twisted everything. Instead of worshiping God and caring for His creation, man does the opposite, living lives full of sin.

In the **redemption** part of the story we see that Jesus came to forgive and began fixing everything. Our guilt is nailed to the cross and Christ has given us a new life, adopted into God's family. We start to live our lives the way God originally created man to live, loving God with all our hearts, soul, mind, and strength. And loving our neighbors as ourselves.

In the **recreation** part of the story we see that God will return and finish fixing everything. The better we understand that death no longer has power over King Jesus or us, we begin to share in His resurrection life, living out His story knowing it will be finished when He returns.

God's story isn't something that we hear once and move on. We need this story over and over again or else we begin to tell ourselves a different story. So we get to begin each week immersing ourselves in *God's story* as we gather at our churches to worship. The songs we sing, the prayers we pray, and the sermon preached, tell the story of the gospel of Christ, *God's story*.

This is why reaching the lost and gathering the reached is so important. There are so many people in our community lost in a cycle of poverty, living their lives separated from God and His people. We reach these people every day with *God's story*. We welcome them into our community at the Mission and demonstrate what it means to have loving relationships with God, self, others and the rest of creation in our daily lives. And we gather them into local churches where they can be discipled alongside you and I. And together we can experience a better story, the *story of God*.
